

Procedure - High School Graduation Requirements

I. PUBLICATION OF GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Prior to registering in high school and each year thereafter, each student and his or her parents or guardians will be provided with a copy of the graduation requirements in effect for that student (those in effect when the student enrolled in ninth grade). Graduation requirements may also be included in the student handbook.

II. CREDIT REQUIREMENTS

Period of Eligibility to Earn Credits

Generally, credit towards high school graduation will be earned in grades nine through twelve. However, upon request, the district may award high school credit towards fulfilling graduation requirements to a student who has completed high school courses while in seventh or eighth grade if one of the following applies:

1. The course was taken with high school students, and the student successfully passed the same course requirements, and examinations as the high school students enrolled in the class; or
2. The course taught at the middle school level has been determined by the district to be similar or equivalent to a course taught at the high school level.

Awarding of High School Credit

The district will award high school credit for successful completion of a specified unit of study. A student successfully completes a specified unit of study by doing one of the following:

- A. Earning a passing grade according to the district's grading policy;
- B. Demonstrating proficiency or mastery of content standards as determined by the district (the district will establish a process for determining proficiency or mastery for credit bearing courses of study); or
- C. Successfully completing an established number of hours of planned instructional activities to be determined by the district.

Credits from Other Programs

The principal or designee is responsible for determining which credits will be recognized by the district for students enrolling from another state approved learning program (public school, approved private school, or home school), or from out-of-state, or out-of-country. The district will accept credits from another Washington public school or accredited state private school or accredited out-of-state public or private school to the extent the credit matches a district graduation requirement or may be counted as an elective credit. Decisions of the principal or designee may be appealed to the superintendent within fifteen school days of the initial decision.

Subject Area Requirements and Approved Courses for Classes of 2019 and Beyond

The following courses are approved for satisfying the subject area requirements as established by the State Board of Education and shall be required of each candidate for graduation:

1. English: Four (4) credits required in *9th Grade English Language Arts, Honors 9th Grade English Language Arts, 10th Grade English Language Arts, Pre-Advanced Placement 10th Grade English Language Arts, 11th Grade English Language Arts, Advanced Placement English Language and Composition, 12th Grade English Language Arts, Bridge to College English Language Arts, Advanced Placement English Literature and Composition.*
2. Math: Three (3) credits are required in *Intensified Algebra 1, Algebra 1, Geometry, Honors Geometry, Algebra 2, Honors Algebra 2, Bridge to College Math, UW Math 120 Pre-Calculus, Advanced Placement Calculus A/B, Advanced Placement Calculus B/C, Advanced Placement Statistics*
3. Science: Three (3) credits are required in *Agricultural Science, Agricultural Biology, Agricultural Horticulture, Integrated Science 1, Integrated Science 2, UW Astronomy 101, Advanced Placement Biology, Chemistry, UW Chemistry 110, Physics, Advanced Placement Physics, Veterinary Science 1, Veterinary Science 2, PLTW Principles Biomedical Science 1, PLTW Human Body Systems, PLTW Medical Interventions, PLTW Introduction to Engineering Design, PLTW Aerospace Engineering.*
4. Social Studies: Three (3) credits are required in *World Studies, Honors World Studies, Western Civilization, Honors Western Civilization, United State History, Advanced Placement United States History, United States Government/Contemporary Issues, Advanced Placement United States Government and Contemporary Issues.*
[Beginning with or before the 2020-21 school year one of these courses must be a one-half credit standalone civics course].
5. Arts: Two (2) credits are required in *Introduction to Drawing 1, Drawing 2, Painting, Ceramics 1, Ceramics 2, Art History, Glass Fusing, Advanced Placement Studio Art, Drama, Music Production, Choir, Select Choir, Vocal Ensemble, Women's Chorus, Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble, Wind Ensemble, Advanced Placement Music Theory, Photography 1, Photography 2, Photography 3, Floral Design 1, Floral Design 2, Multimedia 1, Multimedia 2.*
6. World Language: Two (2) credits are required in *American Sign Language 1, American Sign Language 2, Spanish 1, Spanish 2, Spanish 3, Spanish 4, Honors Spanish 4, Advanced Placement Spanish Language and Culture*
7. Health and Fitness*: Two (2) credits are required in *Health, General Physical Education, Fitness Walking and Wellness, Racquet Sports, Weight Training, Physical Education Leadership, Advanced Physical Fitness, Personal Fitness Training, plus credit earned for Physical Education unless excused.*

8. Career and Technical Education: One (1) credit is required in *Agricultural Biology, Agricultural Communications, Agricultural Horticulture, Agricultural Science, Veterinary Science 1, Veterinary Science 2, PLTW Principles Biomedical Science 1, PLTW Human Body Systems, PLTW Medical Interventions, PLTW Introduction to Engineering Design, PLTW Aerospace Engineering, Staff Assistant, Introduction to Automotive Mechanics, Automotive Technology, Business Math, Personal Finance, Computer Aided Drafting 1, Computer Aided and Mechanical Design, Computer Aided Drafting Design, Computer Aided Modeling 3/D, CISCO Network Training 1, CISCO Network Training 2, Computer Programming 1 and 2, Computer Repair A+ Certification, Advanced Placement Computer Science A, Advanced Placement Computer Science Principles, Culinary Arts 1, Culinary Arts 2, Food Science and Safety, Floral Design 1, Floral Design 2, Introduction to Law, Fashion Marketing, Sports Marketing, Multimedia 1, Multimedia 2, Photography 1, Photography 2, Photography 3, Real World, Robotics Foundations 1, Robotics Foundation 2, Video Game Design, Video Productions GNN, Welding 1, Welding 2, Woodworking 1, Woodworking Cabinet Making, Work Based Learning, Yearbook.*
9. Computer Literacy: Half (.5) credit is required in: Microsoft Imagine Academy, Honors Microsoft Imagine Academy, Advanced Placement Computer Science Principles
10. Electives: Three and a half (3.5) credits are required in *Leadership, Anthropology, Creative Writing, Economics, Psychology 1, Sociology, Study Skills and non-core course listed above*
11. Washington State History (non-credit).

*Per Chapter 28A.231 RCW, each school district must offer instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) in at least one health class required for graduation. The CPR instruction must have been developed by the American Heart of Association or the American Red Cross or be nationally recognized based on the most current national guidelines for CPR. The instruction must include use of automated external defibrillators (AED) which may be taught by video. The district may provide the CPR instruction directly or arrange it through community-based providers such as the local fire department. Students are not required to earn CPR certification for successful completion of the instruction.

Alternative Programs

The district may grant credit toward graduation requirements for planned learning experiences primarily conducted away from the facilities owned, operated, or supervised by the district.

A proposal for approval of out-of-school learning activities will be submitted prior to the experience, will be at no additional cost to the district, and will include at least the following information:

1. The objective(s) of the program;
2. The teaching component(s) of the program, including where and when teaching activities will be conducted by school district certificated staff;
3. A schedule of the duration of the program, including beginning and ending dates within the school year;
4. A description of how student performance will be supervised, evaluated, and recorded by the certificated staff or by qualified school district employees under the direct supervision of the certificated staff;
5. A description of intervention techniques and criteria for their use;
6. A description of how student performance will be assessed;
7. The qualifications of instructional personnel; and
8. The plans for evaluation of program.

The district will keep a list of approved programs on file in the superintendent's office. The superintendent or designee will communicate the reasons for approval or disapproval to those making the request.

Running Start

The Running Start program allows high school juniors and seniors to attend community college classes (100 level or above) for part or all of their schedule. Students must be of junior standing or above to be eligible for the program. Students earn college credit, which is also converted and applied to their high school transcript.

In order to enroll in the Running Start program, students need to do the following:

1. Contact the college they are interested in attending and meet qualifications for college level placement in ELA and/or Math.
2. Speak with their counselor to assess credits needed for graduation, then decide which courses they would like to take at the college. Note that part-time Running Start students will need to coordinate college classes so that they do not interfere with their high school classes. Full-time Running Start students will not be enrolled in courses at the high school, even when the community college they attend is not in session.
3. Obtain a Running Start authorization form from the college or their high school counselor. The counselor will sign the form after the student completes their portion. A parent signature is required if the student is under 18 years old.
4. Take the authorization form to the college and register for classes. Once the classes are completed, the college will notify the high school and credits will be added to the student's transcript.

Credit for Career and Technical Work-Based Learning

The district regards work experience as a part of the educational program of students as part of the secondary school curriculum rather than just a device to relieve a staffing shortage. The district may grant credit for work experience based upon the following factors:

1. The school will supervise the work program.
2. The work experience will specifically relate to the student's school program.
3. The work experience will represent growth in the student, and the type of work will have definite educational value.
4. The work experience will provide a varied job experience.
5. The career placement counselor will supplement the work experience with an adequate program of guidance, placement, follow-up, and coordination between job and school.
6. The work experience may be a planned part of the credit given for a school subject (e.g., sales training class).
7. The district may grant one credit for not less than one hundred eighty hours for instructional work based learning experience and not less than three hundred sixty hours of cooperative work based learning experience related to a student's school program.
8. The employer will legally employ the student who must have passed his or her sixteenth birthday.
9. The employer will file a report of the student's work record with the school, indicating the student made satisfactory progress on the job.
10. The regular state apprenticeship program and school cooperatively develop the student's training, which meets graduation requirements standards.
11. The program standards and procedures align with the state career and technical work based learning standards.

National Guard High School Career Training

The district may grant credit for National Guard high school career training in lieu of either required or elective high school credits. Approval by the district will be obtained prior to a student's participation in a National Guard training program as follows:

1. MIL Form 115 or an equivalent form provided by the National Guard will be completed and filed with the school district; and
2. The number of credits toward high school graduation to be granted will be calculated, agreed upon by the student, and an authorized representative of the school district, and such agreement noted on MIL Form 115 or such equivalent form
3. The district may grant credit toward high school graduation upon certification by a National Guard training unit commander that the student has met all program requirements.

Other Credit

Credit is granted for the following approved schools:

1. Community colleges, vocational-technical institutes, four-year colleges and universities, and approved private schools in the state of Washington, and
2. Other schools or institutions that are approved by the district after evaluation for a particular course offering.

III. STATE ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENT

Each student must earn either a certificate of academic achievement or a certificate of individual achievement to graduate from high school.

Certificate of Academic Achievement

A student will receive a certificate of academic achievement if he or she passes the necessary statewide assessments or a state-approved alternative assessment.

Certificate of Individual Achievement

A student qualifying for special education services may earn a certificate of individual achievement after passing assessments determined by the student's individualized education program team to be appropriate for the student based on their learner characteristics, post-secondary goals, and previous testing history.

Expedited Appeal Process for Waiving Student Assessment Requirements

For the graduating classes of 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2018, an expedited appeal process for waiving specific requirements in RCW 28A.655.061 pertaining to the certificate of academic achievement and the certificate of individual achievement is available for eligible students who have not met the state standard on the English language arts statewide student assessment, the mathematics high school statewide student assessment, or both. The student or the student's parent, guardian, or principal may initiate an appeal with the district and the district has the authority to determine which appeals to submit to the superintendent of public instruction for review and approval.

A student in the class of 2014, 2015, 2016, or 2017 is eligible for the expedited appeal process if he or she has met all other graduation requirements established by the state and district.

A student in the class of 2018 is eligible for the expedited appeal process if he or she has met all other graduation requirements established by the state and district and has attempted at least one alternative assessment option as established in RCW 28A.655.065.

IV. HIGH SCHOOL AND BEYOND PLAN REQUIREMENT

High school and beyond plans must be initiated for students during the seventh or eighth grade to guide their high school experience and prepare them for postsecondary education or training and their careers. The district will encourage parents and guardians to be involved in the process of developing an updating students' high school and beyond plans. School staff will work to update students' plans as necessary based on their changing interests, goals, and needs. Students' plans will be provided to students'

parents or guardians in their native language if that language is one of the two most frequently spoken non-English languages of students in the district.

All high school and beyond plans will, at a minimum, include the following:

- A. Identification of career goals, aided by a skills and interest assessment;
- B. Identification of educational goals;
- C. Identification of dual credit programs and the opportunities they create for students, including but not limited to career and technical education programs, running start programs, and college in the high school programs;
- D. Information about the college bound scholarship program established in chapter 28B.118 RCW;
- E. A four-year plan for course taking that does the following:
 1. Includes information about options for satisfying state and local graduation requirements;
 2. Satisfies state and local graduation requirements;
 3. Aligns with the student's secondary and postsecondary goals;
 4. Identifies dual credit programs and the opportunities they create for students; and
 5. Includes information about the college bound scholarship program.
- D. By the end of the twelfth grade, a current resume or activity log that provides a written compilation of the student's education, any work experience, and any community service and how the school district has recognized the community service.

V. INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE PROGRAMME DIPLOMA

A student who fulfills the requirements for an International Baccalaureate Programme diploma is considered to have satisfied the minimum state requirements for graduation from high school, but the district may require the student to complete additional local graduation requirements. To receive an international baccalaureate diploma, a student must complete and pass all required diploma program courses, as scored at the local level; pass all internal assessments, as scored at the local level; successfully complete all required projects and products, as scored at the local level; and complete the final exams administered by the international baccalaureate organization in each of the required subjects.

VI. WAIVER OF GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

All state requirements must be satisfied except that the district may waive Washington history and government for students who have completed and passed a state history and government course in another state during grades seven through twelve and who have fulfilled study of the Washington state constitution through an alternative learning experience approved by the principal. Additionally, the district may waive physical education, pursuant to [RCW 28A.230.050](#), upon written request of a parent or guardian on account of physical disability, employment, or religious belief or because of participation in directed athletics or military science and tactics. This will not alter the credit requirements established by the board.

The following procedure will be followed in graduation waiver requests:

1. The principal is responsible for evaluating educational experiences of individual students and recommending graduation to the superintendent when a student has not met requirements.

An individual student may be granted an exemption from any requirement in this policy if such requirement impedes the progress toward graduation provided there is a direct relationship between the failure to meet the requirement and the student's ability. When a 12th grade student transfers from another high school, the student may be permitted to graduate with a lesser number of credits provided that minimum state course and credit requirements are satisfied and the student

successfully passes a full schedule of classes during his or her 12th year of school.

2. The principal determines whether to waive graduation requirements using the following procedure:
 - a) The request will be initiated by the parent or the eligible student;
 - b) The principal will investigate the request for waiver of graduation requirements;
 - c) The principal will make a determination in writing based upon appropriate data and upon conclusions of the investigation;
 - d) The principal will develop appropriate record keeping procedures for storage of all pertinent data relating to each waiver request; and
 - e) The principal or designee will notify the parent or eligible student that they may appeal the principal's decision regarding a waiver request in writing to the superintendent no later than 30 days prior to the anticipated graduation date.

VII. SEAL OF BILITERACY

To be awarded the Washington Seal of Biliteracy, graduating high school students must meet the following criteria:

1. Demonstrate proficiency in English by (1) meeting statewide minimum graduation requirements in English as established by the Washington State Board of Education and (2) meeting state standards on the reading and writing or English language arts assessment; and
2. Demonstrate proficiency in one or more world language. For purposes of this section, "world language" is defined as a language other than English, including American Sign Language, Latin, and Native American or other indigenous languages or dialects. Proficiency may be demonstrated by:
 - a) Passing a foreign language Advanced Placement exam with a score of 3 or higher;
 - b) Passing an International Baccalaureate exam with a score of 4 or higher;
 - c) Demonstrating intermediate-mid level or higher proficiency on the American Council on Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) guidelines using assessments approved by OSPI for competency-based credits; and demonstrating proficiency using reading assessments approved by OSPI (when developed);
 - d) Qualifying for four competency-based credits by demonstrating proficiency in speaking, writing, and reading the world language at intermediate-mid level or higher on the ACTFL proficiency guidelines according to Policy 2409, Credit for Competency-Proficiency; or
 - e) Demonstrating proficiency in speaking, writing, and reading the world language through other national or international assessments approved by OSPI.

VIII. STUDENTS WITH AN INDIVIDUALIZED EDUCATION PROGRAM (IEP)

A student with a disability may fulfill graduation requirements as follows:

1. By the age of 14, the student will participate with the IEP Team (including a special education teacher, general education teacher, parents, student, and other school personnel and agency representatives who will assist the student in achieving the goals of the IEP) in a discussion of transition service needs that focuses on the student's course of study.
2. As an outcome of the discussion, the IEP will include appropriate graduation requirements based on the student's individual needs and abilities consistent with the student's transition plan. Modifications to the district's standard graduation requirements may include:

- a) Attainable alternate classwork or individualized activities substituted for standard requirements;
 - b) A statement of waiver for any waived standard graduation requirements; or
 - c) An extension of time for the student to remain in school to complete graduation requirements. The student may remain in school up to and including the school year in which the student reaches twenty-one years of age.
3. The student will, in cooperation with his or her parent or guardian and the IEP team, determine:
 - a) The projected date by which all graduation requirements will be met; and
 - b) The projected date and conditions under which the student will participate in the graduation ceremony.
 4. The student will have an IEP that incorporates all issues and decisions from the above procedures. Any decision that modifies the district's standard graduation requirements will be made through the IEP process. Annually or as needed, the IEP will be reviewed or revised to accommodate the student's progress and development.

IX. GRADUATION CEREMONIES

If students fulfill graduation requirements by the end of the last term of their senior year, they may participate in graduation ceremonies. Each student will be awarded a diploma after satisfactorily completing local and state requirements. Upon request, each graduating student will receive a final transcript. Each student will be notified of this opportunity at least one month prior to the close of the school term.

Graduation ceremonies will be conducted in the following manner:

1. Each participating student must participate in the graduation ceremony rehearsal. Each student who participates will purchase or rent the proper cap and gown as designated by the school administration and the class advisor and officers.
2. Caps and gowns will be worn in the proper manner, as designated by the school administration and class advisor.
3. Students who participate will use good taste in their choice of accessories for their attire.
4. Each student who participates will cooperate with the class advisor and participate in all parts of the graduation ceremonies.
5. Failure to comply with the above requirements may forfeit a student's privilege to participate in the graduation ceremonies.

X. WITHOLDING OF A DIPLOMA

The district may withhold a student's diploma or transcript until the student pays for any school property the student has lost or willfully damaged. Upon payment for damages, or the equivalency through voluntary work, the district will release the diploma or transcript. When the damages or fines do not exceed \$100, the student or his/her parents will have the right to an appeal using the same process as used for short-term suspension as defined in Policy 3241, [Classroom Management, Discipline and Corrective Action](#). When damages are in excess of \$100, the appeal process for long-term suspension as defined in Policy 3241, [Classroom Management, Discipline and Corrective Action](#), will apply. The district may, in its discretion, choose to offer in-school suspension in these circumstances.

In the event that the district has imposed other forms of corrective action for violations of school rules, the district may deny the student's participation in graduation ceremonies. Such exclusion from graduation ceremonies is regarded as a school suspension. In such instances, the district will grant the diploma.
